

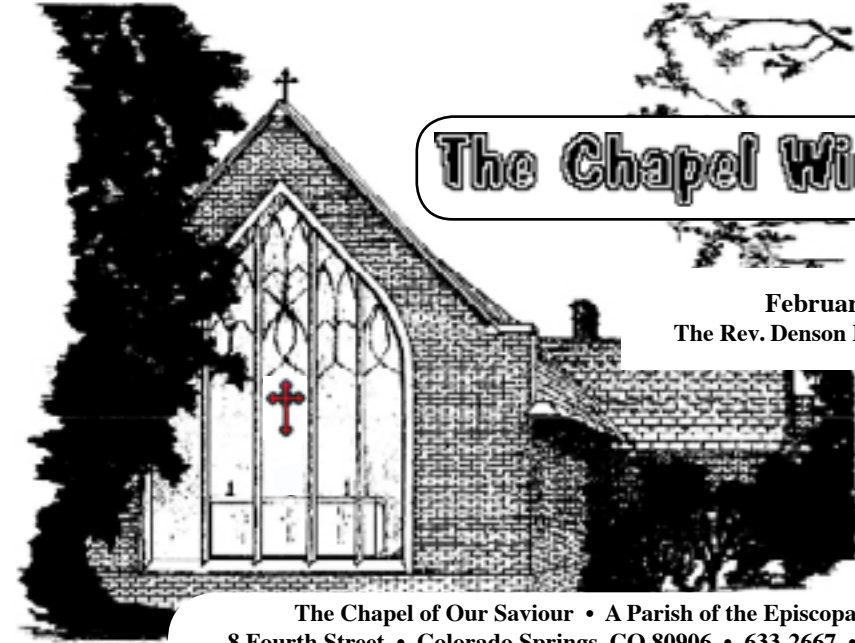

## THE RECTOR'S FLOSS

FEBRUARY 2012

As a follower of Christ before being a priest in God's church, I am continuously looking for God's will in nearly all that I undertake. I strive for certainty in my faith walk with God. It is certainly the case that I can look at events and situations past and see God's handiwork in nearly every facet of my life. I do not think I am alone in this regard, as I believe all of us seek to find God's will in our lives, and also that whether we see it or not, God is working through each and every one of us.

Church communities should recognize that discerning God's will for the congregation is the most important thing to strive to understand. The mission of the church should loudly proclaim the parishioner's belief of God's will for the congregation; that is to say what God is calling us to do, or to be. I knew what our Parish Profile had stated before I arrived, and I had learned some of the rich traditions and fond memories of years past, but I was still interested in a better understanding of the current mission of our parish. So on a cool morning in March 2011, I asked our vestry, "What are we doing as a church, and what are our plans for the future? Most of all, what is God calling us to be?" I'd like to tell you that the answer I received was an immediate and unanimous spouting of the mission statement, "to unite God's people in love, community, and service through Christ." Instead the answer I received was an even greater statement because the resounding answer given was a string of hope-filled uncertainties, and a desire to grow spiritually, faithfully and even numerically.

So for months since then has been, "What is God calling us to do?" The Vestry was really close on several occasions in articulating this call or mission, but in early January of this year the answer came out like this: We believe God is calling us to be **"Open in spirit, deep in faith, rich in worship, active in service."** At the annual meeting on January 28, this new mission was adopted and will play a guiding force for decisions being made. It will serve as a benchmark for how we plan, how we budget and most importantly how we work together doing the work God has given us to do. Many of you have made suggestions, and for 2012 here are just a few of the things we will be working on (volunteers needed in each category), according to God's call:

IF YOU ARE UNABLE TO WORK YOUR SCHEDULED DAY AND TIME, please find your own sub. Usually it is easiest to trade with another volunteer already scheduled. Please notify Hedy DuCharme at 576-3716 of the change. If it is short notice and you are unable to reach Hedy, be sure to give Thrift House a call, 632-5278. Thrift House will not find subs and must have three persons per shift to open the doors.

- Youth ministry is often on and off which discourages families with young children from engaging;
- Clergy, staff and lay leaders often feel over-extended;
- Is an anxiety-laden hybrid congregation at risk;
- An easy equilibrium remains elusive;
- Needs to eventually move to a smaller pastoral-sized or larger program-sized congregation to remain viable.

**Program-sized: ASA 226 – 400**

- Challenge is how to grow bigger but remain intimate;
- Operate as much around programs and ministries as worship;
- Members maintain intimate groups around their areas of ministry and involvement in activities;
- Many small group activities: evangelism, pastoral care, service, etc;
- Pastoral care comes chiefly from a ministry group;
- The Rector is not a friend to every parishioner;
- The Rector manages tasks and oversees staffs and lay leadership teams;
- The Vestry concentrates on strategic issues involving managed growth of the congregation, policy and discernment oriented; task-specific committees surround the Vestry with input and planning;
- There are multiple staff positions that operate the business of the church;
- A wide variety of ministries and programs where excellence is the objective scale;
- Diverse needs-based programs aimed at the needs of BOTH members and the surrounding community;
- Effective communication across the entire congregation is a high priority;
- Mission, Vision, Values and Strategic Planning are particularly important; the Congregation must have a strong sense of purpose;
- Emphasis on growing lay leadership to spread the load of increasing ministries and programs;
- Lay-driven ministries as opposed to clergy-driven;
- 20 – 60 pool of potential lay leaders;
- A wide range of identified options for growth, expansion;
- Those who don't 'fit' leave but that's OK as more newcomers engage in ministries and activities that are important to their lives;
- Average pledge: \$1800 - \$2400;
- The strength of this church is in its program offerings and they carry the congregation along
- This is a church with many side doors.

So, as you can see, these classifications (again, three of a total of five) of church size only begin with the numbers of average Sunday attendance; their characteristics and dynamics extend well beyond the numbers to the nature, interaction and purpose of the congregation. If you have further questions or input as to Our Saviour's classification – a transition congregation moving forward to a program-sized one – please talk with a Vestry member.

**Sizing Up the Chapel of Our Saviour Congregation**

During this fall’s stewardship soirees and again at the Annual Meeting, classifications of congregational size and characteristics were frequently mentioned, specifically ‘pastoral,’ ‘transitional,’ and ‘program’-sized churches. As these definitions have also been incorporated into the Vestry’s new Vision Statement, introduced for general comment at the annual meeting, it should help to have a deeper understanding of these classifications and where they come from.

Two forward-thinking members of the Episcopal Church—Arlin **Rothauge**, former Congregational Development Officer, and Kevin **Martin**, Canon for Congregational Development for the Diocese of Texas – collaborated on defining the size dynamics of Episcopal congregations, and in 1995, released the following classifications: Family-sized, Pastoral-sized, Transitional, Program-sized and Resource-sized. While they were pegged to the metric of average Sunday attendance, these classifications went deeper into the characteristics and dynamics of congregations that reflected the norm among those five sizes. The Diocese of Colorado in its congregational development activities has adopted these definitions as well.

**Pastoral-sized: Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) 76 – 140**

Chief characteristics include:

- Operates around networks of families and friends: everyone ‘knows’ everyone else;
- Parishioners chiefly interact around Sunday worship services;
- Parishioners expect direct access to and pastoral care from the Rector;
- The rector facilitates and is involved in the leadership of all ministries;
- ‘Better than last year’ is the objective scale for growth in ministries and programs;
- The Vestry is involved in front-line operational decisions;
- There is a minimum of staff to assist the Rector;
- Lay leaders tend to hold more than one leadership post and there is a maximum of 15-20 leaders;
- The Rector is the gatekeeper for newcomers and primary evangelist;
- Average pledge is \$1200-\$1600 and the annual budget ranges between \$120,000-\$150,000;
- Expectations for growth and expansion are very modest and limited by what more the Rector can take on;
- According to Lyle Schaller: the pastoral-sized church is the *disappearing* church in the US.

**Transitional: ASA 141 – 225**

- Parish is defined by turbulence, instability, uncertainty, fluctuation, and stress;
- Parishioners feel a loss of intimacy and some elect to leave;
- Growing staff requirements present management issues and more stress;
- The Rector is caught between relational leadership and organizational leadership;
- The Vestry is caught between front-line (“Should we buy that rebuilt lawnmower?”) and strategic (“How can we expand outreach or youth formation?”) decisions;
- There is confusion over expectations: 75% pastoral and 75% program;
- Stretched budgets become an even greater source of stress; need regular fund raisers to meet operating costs;



## **NEW DATE FOR 8@7**

We're going to try something new for 8@7. At the Annual Meeting on January 28, comments were made about the importance of keeping the family feel of our church even as we grow in numbers. 8@7 is a perfect way to do that!

Comments made by Jane Andrews, Alan McPeak, and input from Robin Sumners and Harry and Creta Gerhart, as well as others at the meeting who mentioned the need for smaller groups and ways for us to meet each other from other services (Middy Divelbiss's comment) gave Susan Hykes and me some new ideas. So here is what we are going to try.

The next 8@7 will be Friday, March 16 (not on a Sunday since we now have a service then). And, we will meet in the Parish Hall. And we will have one in March, one in April, and one in May. Those are the big changes that we will try.

We are going to limit the first one to between 32 and 48 people, or four tables in Casey Hall and two tables in the Dining Room. You will still need to sign up. You will still need to bring food, and probably wine. We will ask for a table "captain," who will be the host of that table, and for volunteers to help with set-up and clean-up.

On the Sunday before the potluck, Susan and I will divide up the list, put you at a table for 8, and assign you an appetizer, salad, vegetable, entrée, dessert, and/or wine. Then that Friday, we'll gather in the Parish Hall at 7 p.m. for appetizers, punch and wine, where you will have a chance to meet lots of people. Then you'll eat with eight people at your assigned table.

These ideas are in the planning stages. What do you need to do? In the month of February, talk to Susan or Bonnie about ways to refine this idea to meet your needs. Mark your calendars now for Friday, March 16. And on February 26 start to sign up!

## **Safeguarding God's Children Training**

**8:00 a.m. - 12:00 pm.**

Jesus Christ calls us to loving relationships that are healthy and helpful to each other, not taking advantage of those who are weaker or putting people in situations that are inappropriate for their age or maturity. All persons involved in ministry, whether receiving or giving care, deserve to be treated as Jesus Christ would treat them: with love, respect, kindness.

All participants in ministry deserve to be in a safe environment, which includes, but is not limited to, an environment that is free from harassment, abuse, and misconduct. Our Bishop, Diocese of Colorado, and Chapel of Our Saviour are committed to creating environments that are physically, spiritually and emotionally safe for all of God's children. Towards this end all volunteers who work with children in any capacity at Chapel of Our Saviour are required to attend a Safeguarding God's Children training.

The Safeguarding God's Children program and training was designed by the (Episcopal) Church Pension Group, and is aimed at reminding us of the promise we make at every child's baptism to love and respect one another, and to protect all of God's children from childhood sexual abuse. This curriculum is taught regularly at Episcopal churches throughout the United States, Colorado, and several times a year at Chapel of Our Saviour. It is a half-day training that consists of two video presentations, information and discussion. The presentation will be led by Susan Garsoe and Betsi Fredrickson.

If you are interested in creating a safe environment for our children and youth, and you work with or are responsible in anyway for children in our parish, please come and join us for this training. If you cannot attend this training on this date, let me know and I will share other training dates at other churches in and around Colorado Springs and Denver.

## MUSIC MUSING:

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**“Open in spirit, deep in faith, rich in worship, active in service”**

That’s our new mission statement. And doesn’t it beautifully capture what we want to do and be!

Of course, I am drawn to the “rich in worship” statement. Hopefully the music program is all of those: open in spirit, deep in faith, rich in worship, and active in service. But music is most seen and heard as part of the worship services. So, what does it mean to be *rich* in worship, as opposed to *open* in worship, or *active* in worship, or *deep* in worship?

I love the choice of *rich*. *Rich* goes beyond money. Some additional definitions are: magnificently impressive, vivid and deep in color, of great value, lush; and since one of the roots of rich is the Latin word *rex* for king, by extraction, royal.

And Episcopal worship is just that. We are a royal priesthood in a royal place. Our eyes are treated to pageantry, to colors and vestments, to a beautiful church looking to the mountains. Our ears hear the hymns of ages, composed with a lush and extensive chord palette. Choir and instruments lead us in praise. Incense, the smell of candles, of Advent wreaths alert our noses; we taste and handle the elements at the Eucharist. We are alive. Our senses richly tell us that.

There are two services in our church where there is no music and no Eucharist: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On Ash Wednesday, we hear, “Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.” We are reminded of our own mortality, of our sinfulness and the poverty of our own soul. Seven+ weeks later, as we have passed through Lent, comes Good Friday. Again there is no music and no Eucharist, as we see the altar stripped, all things of beauty taken away, as we are forced to face the poverty of the world without Jesus.

These two bare and stark services with no music and no Eucharist: through the stripping away of our sense involvement, poverty of worship? By no means. Just as the mountains define the valleys, the lush the stark, so Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are part of and define our “rich” worship. Yes. Chapel of Our Saviour: open in spirit, deep in faith, rich in worship, active in service. —Bonnie Linder
